

Arrangements for the 40th Annual ACH Conference

Dates

The 40th annual conference of the Association of Caribbean Historians is scheduled for **May 11-16, 2008** in Paramaribo, Suriname. Registration will take place at the Krasnapolsky Hotel from Sunday 11th May 2008, 2pm-5pm. The Opening Ceremony of the Conference will take place on Sunday 11th May 2007 at the Krasnapolsky. The academic programme takes place between Monday, 12th May 2008 and Thursday 15th May, with Friday 16th May reserved for the field trip.

Conference Fee

The regular conference fee is **US\$125.00**; but for Caribbean-based students, it is **US\$30.00** and for non-Caribbean based students, **US\$60.00**. Fess are payable in cash or travelers' cheques only. **No credit card payments please**. An exception will be made for citizens of Suriname who will pay their registration fees in their own currency.

Annual Dues to ACH

The annual fees paid by members of the ACH are due at or before the Conference. Presenters who are presenting for the first time are advised that it is recommended that they pay the fees ahead of the Conference.

Accommodation

<u>Conference</u>: The Conference sessions will be held at the **Krasnapolsky Hotel located in downtown, Paramaribo, Suriname**.

All Hotel rates are quoted at Room/per night

<u>Hotel</u>: Special rates have been arranged with the **Krasnapolsky Hotel in Parimaribo** as follows (Rates are in Euros):

Single 73.00 Euros; Double 87.00 Euros; Senior suite 159.00 Euros Reservations must be guaranteed by a major credit card. Delegates are encouraged to make their reservations directly with the hotel **by March 31, 2007**.

<u>Hotel</u>: Other Hotels include the **Eco Resort**, where the rates range from US\$60-80 with a Single room at \$60.00 and a Double at \$75.00, and the **Torarica** where a 15% discount has been arranged. The rates at the **Torarica** are as follows: Single room \$111.00, Double room \$130.00, Executive Single, \$137.00, Executive Double, \$156.00 (prices may vary slightly).

Some guesthouse accommodation may be available for students near the Conference venue. Contact the LOC for information on such facilities.

Travel and Entry Requirements

CARICOM nationals do not require a visa, but must have a valid passport for entry to Suriname. Citizens of other countries may require visas on the basis of reciprocity. That is, where countries require Suriname citizens to have visas, the Suriname government will require citizens of those countries, including the USA, to obtain a visa. The Suriname Consulate (all embassies are located in Washington, D.C.) in the USA is located in Miami. In such cases, those attending the Conference will need to check with their consular authorities and make arrangements to obtain a visa well in advance of the May 11-16, 2008 date.

Airport Pick-Up and Departure

Transportation from the Zanderij airport, near Paramaribo, to the **Krasnapolsky Hotel** will be provided on **Saturday May 10, and Sunday May 11, 2008**. Transportation to the airport from the **Krasnapolsky** will be provided on **Saturday May 17 and Sunday May 18**. Please indicate travel information on the pre-registration form below.

Weather and Dress

Temperatures are normally between 25 and 30 degrees Celsius. The conference room may be fairly cool, so bring a light jacket. For evening receptions, delegates are advised to bring appropriate apparel. (Please bear in mind that the month of May is during the rainy season in Suriname).

Transportation to and from the conference venue

Some transportation will be provided between the other hotels listed and the **Krasnapolsky** Hotel daily.

Paper Submission and Formatting

Papers with abstracts in English, French and Spanish (maximum 250 words) <u>must reach</u> <u>the LOC by March 31 2008</u> for duplication. Presenters should send a <u>diskette or CD, and</u> <u>a hard copy</u> (no fax or email please) of their paper.

Papers must **<u>not exceed 25 pages</u>** (inclusive of references and bibliography), must be **<u>double spaced</u>**, <u>**font size 12**</u> and typed using <u>**Microsoft Word**</u> programme.

The paper and abstract must be accompanied with the full name and institutional affiliation of the author and be sent to Dr. Jerome Egger, Institute for Social Science Research (IMWO), P.O Box 602, Paramaribo, Suriname tel. (597) 462003.

Missed Deadline Procedure

Presenters unable to meet the deadline of 31st March 2008 must notify the LOC and bring at least 120 copies of their paper for distribution by the LOC, provided that the papers are delivered to the Conference Secretariat at least a full 24 hours prior to the scheduled panel presentation of the paper.

Non-Attendance

Additionally, if possible, presenters who are unable to attend the conference due to unforeseen circumstances must notify the Local Organizing Committee in good time before the deadline for submission. The ACH views with disfavor the issue of non-attendance, without appropriate notification, where approval had been granted to a paper proposal. In cases where such non-attendance, without notification occurs, the ACH reserves the right to disregard subsequent paper proposals from such individuals.

Canadian Association for Latin American and Caribbean Studies (CALACS) 2008 Congress Vancouver, BC June 4-7, 2008 At the Crossroads of Empire

Latin America and the Caribbean have been profoundly shaped by the rise and fall of Empires, from pre-Columbian civilizations to European expansionism and on to US strategies for hemispheric supremacy. Yet the region has also been a crucial site for the articulation of movements of resistance to imperial projects. The global political fields of the early 21st century are now posing new, challenging questions about the social, cultural, and political dimensions of such processes on the continent. The 2008 CALACS conference to be held in Vancouver convokes scholars from across the social sciences and the humanities as well as activists and artists to offer a fresh look at the influence of imperial schemes on Latin America and the Caribbean and at the range of social movements and government projects that contest them. In addition, the conference welcomes submissions related to other themes involving Latin America and the Caribbean.
